



Science and Policy: Introduction to Political Sciences

Course Description

The course offers an introduction to political science for experts from natural sciences. We discuss theoretical approaches to the study of politics and policies across a range of states, international organizations and issue areas.

You will learn about the influence of political actors on decision-making processes, political negotiations and public opinion.

Course Program

Introduction: What is politics? Approaches to the study of politics: What is a policy analysis?

Overview about the leading ideologies in political sciences: Left versus right. Liberalism, conservatism, socialism, radicalism

Democracies: how can a government be democratic?

Actors in politics: international organizations, national governments, legislatures, political parties, public administrations, interest groups and NGOs

Public opinion: mass media and popular rights

Decision making, negotiations and evaluation: identity and roles of participants, leaders and leadership styles, evaluation of public policies and policy outcomes

Prior Knowledge: None

Number of Participants: Participation is limited to 25 people.

Individual Performance and Assessment:

In order to obtain the ECTS point, each participant is required to actively participate in the case-study work and discussions during the course days. In addition, participants are expected to:

- a) read the required reading before the course days. The reading will be available in PDF in advance (before the Easter holiday).
- b) prepare for the second day a written essay and a short presentation. The essays mainly consist in answering a couple of questions concerning the required reading.

Lecturer: Dr. Sarah Bütikofer studied Political Science and International Law at the University of Zurich and the Universitat Pompeu Fabra in Barcelona. She was a lecturer and research associate at the universities of Zurich and Geneva and received her PhD in Political Science from the University of Zurich in 2011. She is currently involved in several research projects on Swiss parliamentary studies and teaches Swiss politics in various institutions.
